Each time students review, revisit, and update, the 10-year Plan becomes more meaningful and, therefore, more motivational. Having the plans **online** makes quantitative data readily available to appropriate faculty members for academic coaching and counseling sessions.

Module Design Overview

Each module has 16 lessons

This equals 1 unit optional dual credit. Turn to 6/20. The Get Focused...Stay Focused!³⁹ Initiative begins with the development of a 10-year Plan in a Career Choices course that addresses the Standards for a Freshman Transition Course. That initial experience is followed by the systematic updating and expanding of the 10-year Plan in an academic setting to support mastery of the Common Core State Standards for English Language Arts and promote college and career readiness.

- Advisory/Extended Learning (master teachers)

Implementation: Advisory

- Advisory/Extended Learning (all teachers)
 - "Homeroom" class
 - Grade specific
 - Every teacher has their "advisory" cohort that they follow for all four years of high school
- Advantages
 - All teachers participate in the GFSF Implementation
- Challenges
 - Training all teachers
 - Fidelity to the program

Implementation: Advisory (Master Teachers)

• Advisory/Extended Learning (master teachers)

- "Homeroom" class
- Grade Specific
- Students leave "homeroom" and go to GFSF teacher for instruction on modules
- Advantages
 - Master teacher who knows curriculum
 - Greater fidelity
 - Quality of instruction
- Challenges
 - Scheduling
 - Maintaining the school-wide initiative if not all teachers are participating in program implementation

Implementation: Core Subjects

- Core Subjects (eg. English and History)
 - Modules are embedded across academic disciplines which all students are required to take
- Advantages
- When Modules are embedded across the core curriculum, students seem to take it more seriously (grade attached)
- Fits into master schedule
- Provides curriculum to address College and Career Readiness Standards (Common Core)
- Enhances school-wide initiative
- Challenges
 - Fidelity to the program
 - Pacing with existing curriculum

Implementation: Junior Seminar

- Junior Seminar
 - Stand alone course (eg. Success 102)
 - All Modules are taught in sequence
- Advantages
 - Could be offered as an additional course for credit (and/or dual enrollment credit)
 - Streamlines implementation
- Challenges
 - "Spiraling" curriculum requires more time to foster student growth
 - Finding space in master schedule

Implementation: Focused Friday

- Focused Friday
 - Across curriculum, the 16 lessons are divided and taught by different faculty every Friday
- Advantages
 - Enhances school-wide initiative
 - Shared responsibility makes implementation easier to manage
- Challenges
 - Fidelity to the program
 - Scheduling/Pacing
 - Training of multiple teachers

Implementation: Other Options

- Distance education/online option
- Counselor as instructor
- Team teaching
- Workshop format multiple classes

TIER 3 • INTENSIVE:

The most intensive of the three tiers often requires one-toone support or addresses a considerable skill gap for students at the lowest levels of academic or social emotional achievement. Included in this group are many students with IEPs for a range of disabilities.

TIER 2 • TARGETED:

Students receiving targeted interventions have demonstrated the need for support to supplement what is offered in the classroom. These are most often small group interventions delivered to special or general education students within the classroom or as a pull-out.

TIER 1 • UNIVERSAL:

As part of high quality instruction, in a climate of positive classroom culture, students receive interventions at many points throughout the day. Skillful teachers plan for and execute interventions that adjust and accommodate to the unique behavioral and academic
